Like the Meetinghouses of old, ours was designed to show that we cannot meet with Jesus without meeting one another, both friends and strangers. We are transformed by encountering Jesus, and that encounter is demonstrated as we learn to love our neighbors as ourselves. As Meetinghouse Church, we wholeheartedly affirm Jesus' Great Commandment—we love Jesus, care for our neighbors, and refuse to separate the two.

- 2023-2024: Create and implement a stewardship plan to sustainably increase overall giving and gradually reduce the amount drawn from Foundation for operating budget.



Meet with our Neighbors

- August 2023: Missions Team completes the evaluation process to update our missional partnerships to align with our Core Values and maximize opportunities for congregational engagement.
- By July 2023: Utilize findings from Neighborhood Listening Project into an action plan to be shared with the congregation in a Town Hall meeting and via e-newsletter.
- August 2023: Form a Building Usage Task Force to create a plan (a) to update our building aesthetic, (b) orient our building around neighborhood needs, and (c) maximize opportunities for building revenue.
